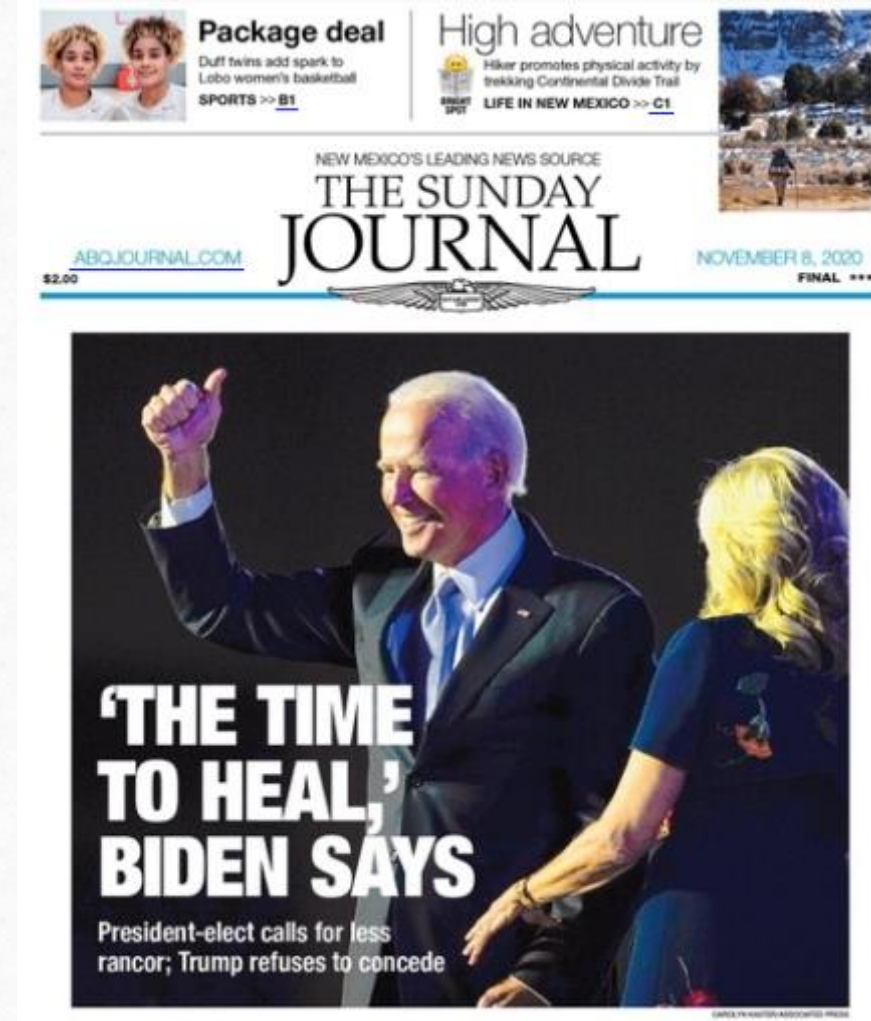
2020 Election Review

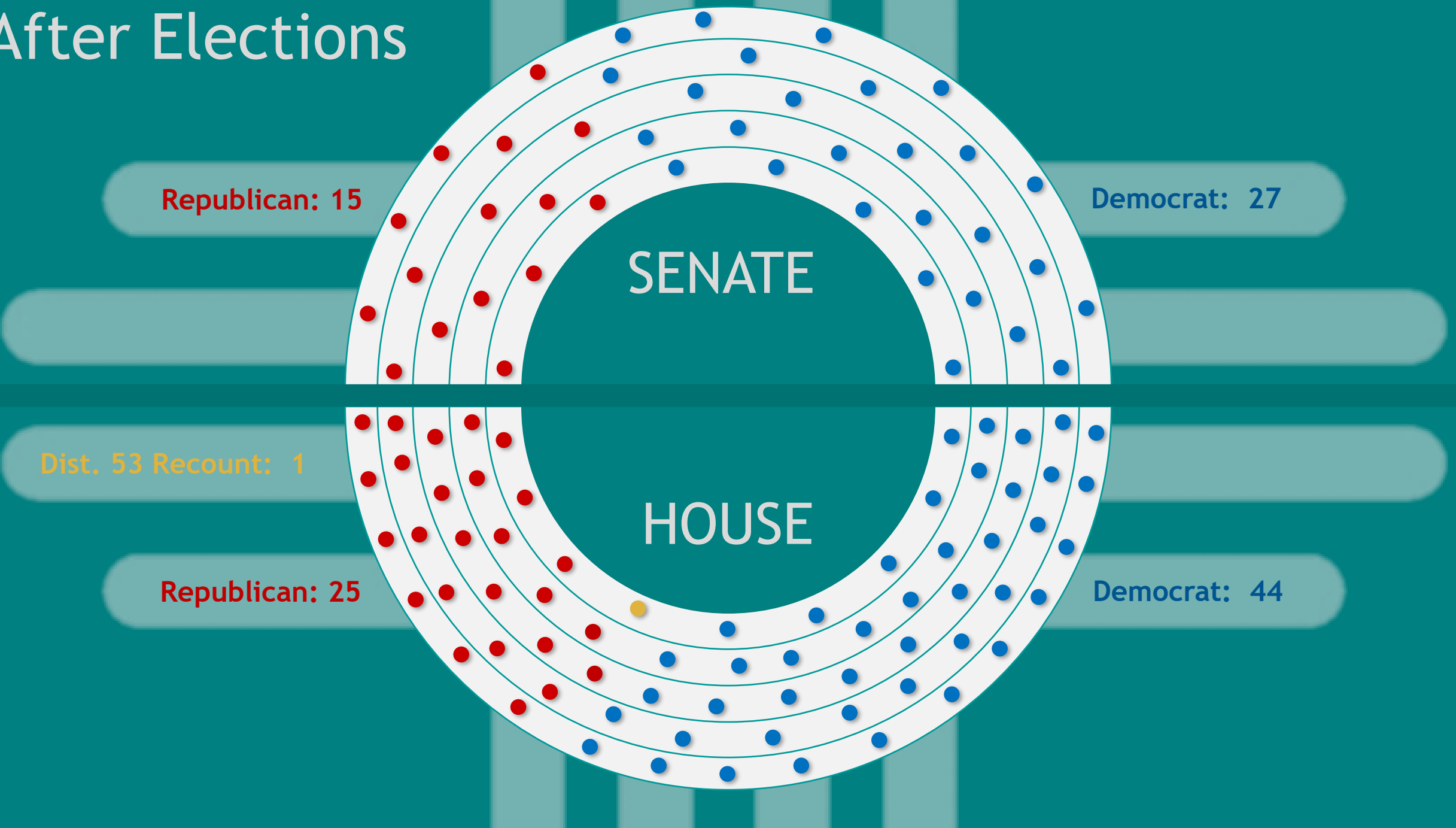

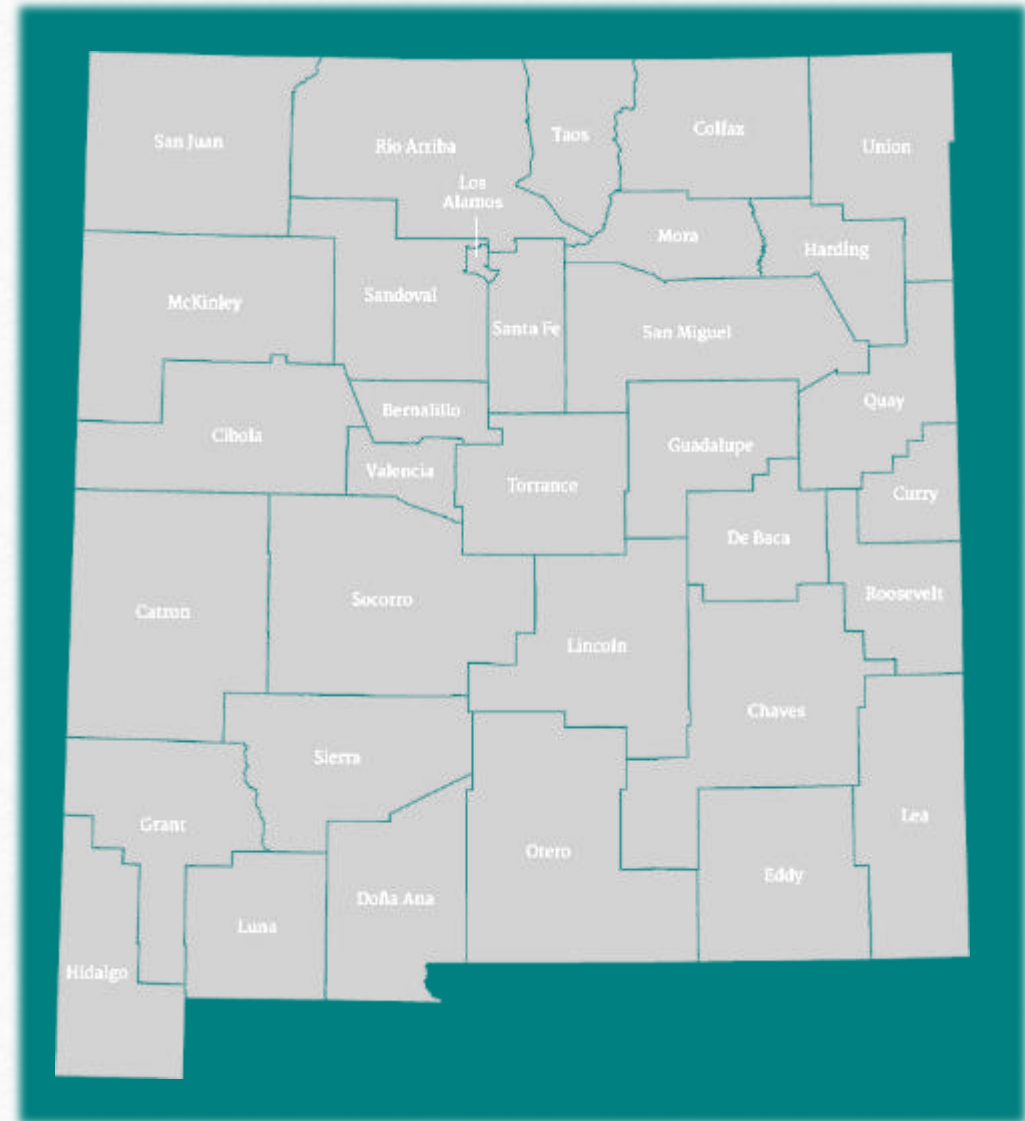

[A]n analysis by The Economist suggests that the partisan divide between America's dense cities and sparsely populated places is greater than ever.

*Preliminary election results supplied by Decision Desk HQ, a data-provider, **show that voters in the least urbanized counties voted for Trump by a margin of 35 points, up from 32 points in 2016.***

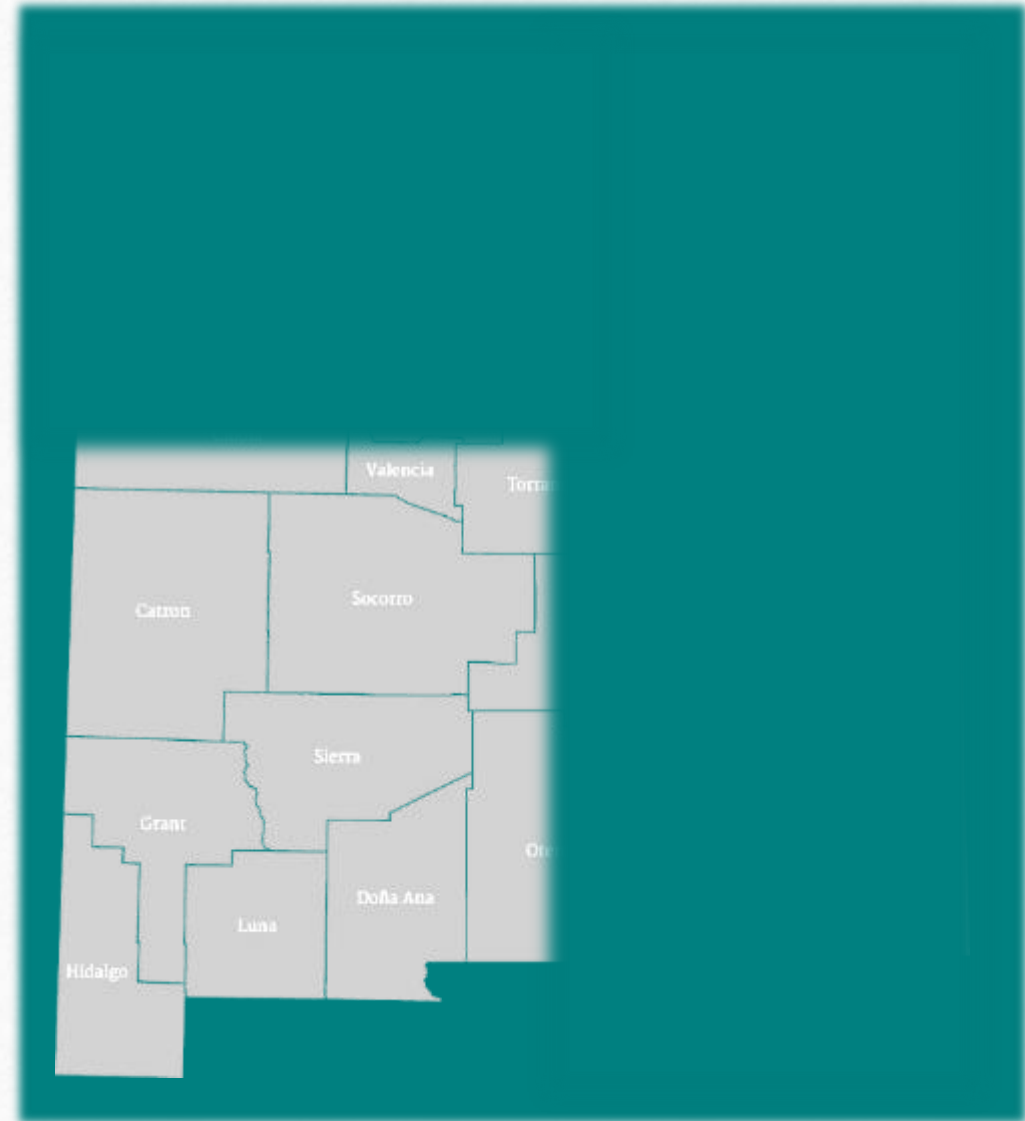

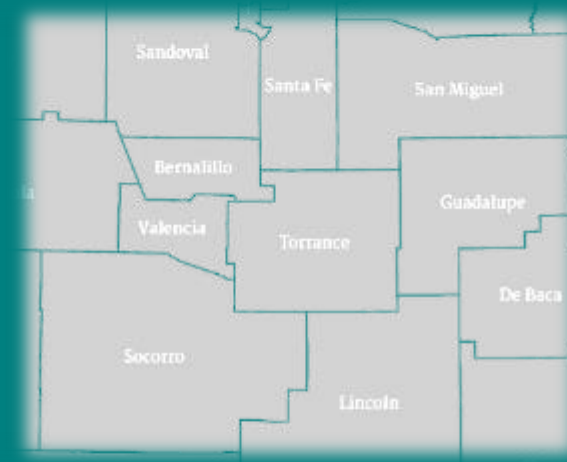

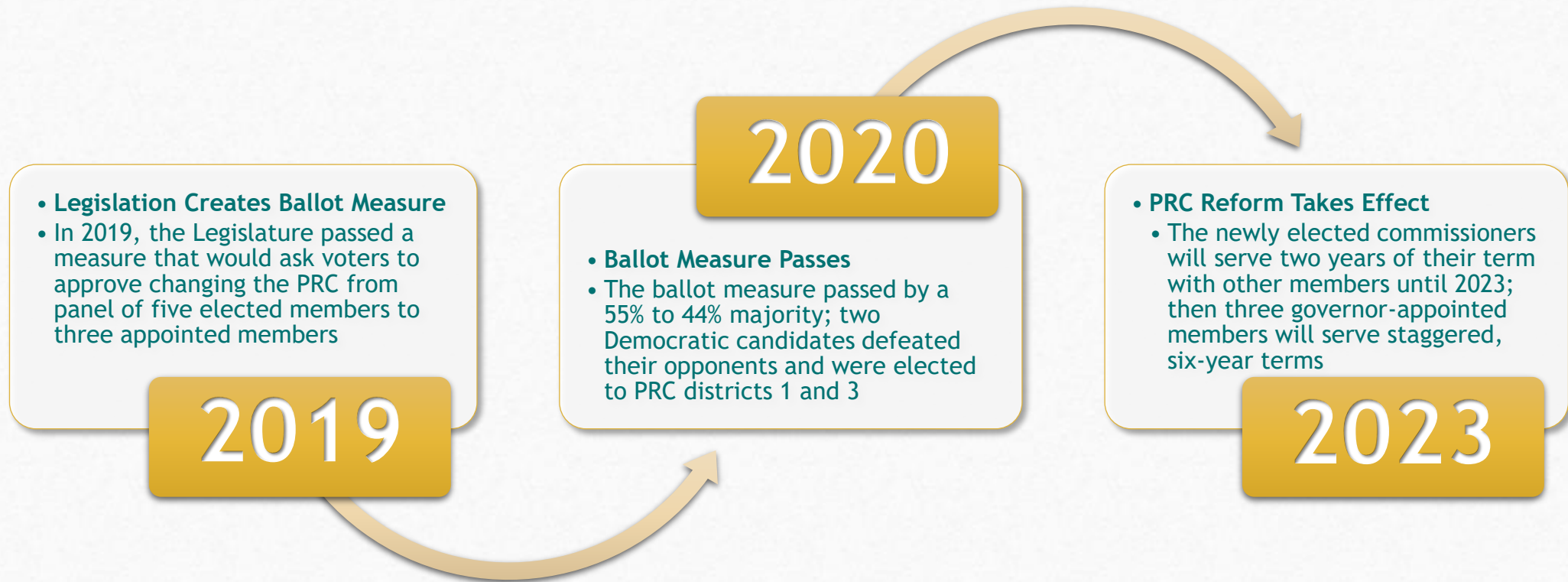

Session & Lobbying Updates

Updates

2021 Legislative Session

- Prefiling is January 4 through 15
- Session starts January 19
- Session ends March 20
- The Legislature will convene in person with ongoing debate about public participation

Lobbyists

- Registration renewals 1/1/21
- Next report due in January 2021
- Keep in mind that lobbyists will be required to use the new CFIS and a new training will be available
